CHNA Background

Pineville Community Health Center contracted with the Community and Economic Development Initiative of Kentucky (CEDIK) in the summer of 2020 to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) in accordance with the Affordable Care Act. The Affordable Care Act, enacted March 23, 2010, added new requirements that hospital organizations must satisfy in order to be described in section 501(c)(3), as well as new reporting and excise taxes.

The IRS requires hospital organizations to complete a CHNA and adopt an implementation strategy at least once every three years. This CHNA is the first prepared by CEDIK for this organization.

Here is an overview of the CHNA process that CEDIK uses based on the IRS guidelines:

A Portrait of the Community Served by Pineville Community Health Center

Pineville, population 1,831 (2019), is one of the oldest settlements in Kentucky, located at the crossing of the Cumberland River by the Wilderness Road in Bell County, total population 26,561 (2019). Pineville serves as the county seat.

The economy is dependent on the coal mining industry, local family owned businesses and tourism. Residents and visitors alike enjoy Pine Mountain State Resort Park, Kentucky Mountain Laurel Festival, and nearby Cumberland Gap National Historical Park.

In order to determine the primary service area of PCHC, Inc. for this assessment, patient origin and not just geographic location revealed that 76.25% of the patient population originates from Pineville and Bell County. This demonstrates that the assessment includes the majority of the population served.



Assessment Process

The assessment process included collecting secondary data related to the health of the community. Social and economic data as well as health outcomes and provider data were collected from secondary sources to help provide context for the community (see below). Finally, with the assistance of the Community Steering Committee, input from the community was collected through focus group discussions, key informant interviews and surveys.

First we present the demographic, social, economic and health outcomes data that were compiled through secondary sources. These data that follow were retrieved from County Health Rankings April 2021. For data sources see appendix.

The Community Steering Committee

The Community Steering Committee plays a vital role to the CHNA process. CEDIK provides a list of community leaders, agencies and organizations to the hospital to assist them in the recruitment of members that would facilitate broad community input.

These committee members represent organizations and agencies that serve the Bell county population in a variety of areas that relate to a populations health. By volunteering their time, the committee members enabled the hospital to acquire input from residents that are often not engaged in conversations about their health needs. The steering committee provides both an expert view of the needs they see while working with the people and clients they serve and in extensive distribution of the community survey. Conducting this assessment during the COVID-19 pandemic added new challenges in accessing community input, however the community steering committee was committed to the process both with promoting the survey through social media and through organization's listsery.

Upon recruitment to the steering committee, CEDIK representatives schedule and complete a virtual meeting to introduce the assessment process, the role and duties of a committee member and conduct a facilitated discussion in a focus group format. A final steering committee was held via Zoom for the reporting of survey, focus group, and key informant interview results and to complete a prioritization process of the identified health needs with the goal to make recommendations for the hospital to address over the next three years.

Community Feedback

Focus Group and Key Informant Interviews

In July 2020, members of the PCHC, Inc. CHNA steering committee participated in a focus group for this community health needs assessment. The committee membership includes representation from the health department, behavioral health, public schools, family resource centers, cooperative extension and community based services. The members bring knowledge and expertise related to health needs of the populations they serve.

In addition, a total of three key informant interviews were completed in late summer and fall of 2020. Below is a summary of the responses that highlights the results of the conversations that identify strengths of the community and the healthcare system, challenges/barriers in the broader healthcare system and opportunities for improving the health of the community.

Vision for a Healthy and Vibrant Bell County

- More jobs in the area
- Reduced substance use
- Health education
- Public transportation system
- Food security and healthy food available
- Programs for retired coal miners
- YMCA for families to exercise & youth sports
- Grow healthcare services to be more robust and the best available in the region

Most Significant Health Needs in Bell County

- Obesity/sedentary lifestyles
- Diabetes
- Substance use (opioids)
- Heart disease
- Cancer lung, brain, bone and others
- Tobacco use and vaping
- Kidney problems (transportation to dialysis treatment)
- · Healthy foods are expensive
- Mental health youth and senior adults
- Single parents/grandparents raising children

Perception of Current Healthcare System – Strengths

- Lack of knowledge about resources in community
- Internet access (about 42% of households have internet)
- Loss of confidence in hospital
- Lack of education on healthy choices, and importance of making those healthy choices with food and exercise
- Financial reasons must choose what they spend their money on i.e. light bill or medical bill

How to Better Meet Health Needs or Improve Health in Bell County

- Health education on substance use and nutrition (schools and public)
- Substance use treatment
- Additional specialists or specialty clinics (allergy/asthma, ENT, nephrologist, cardiologist, pediatrics, endocrinologist)
- Public transportation
- Telehealth (linked to specialists)
- Market services offered at hospital and in community
- Campaign to increase confidence in the hospital
- · Affordable health care for people who lack insurance or have high deductibles
- Health literacy training for public how to make an appointment, questions to ask, how to take medications safely and correctly




Households that have used hospital services in the past 24 months.




Households that are currently without health insurance.

Hospitals households visited in the past 24 months:











Households satisfied with the ability to access healthcare services in Bell County.

Households used any of the specialty services below in the past 24 months at PCHC or other hospital.






Why respondents went to a different hospital than PCHC:




How far households travel to see a specialist:




Respondent's rating of their health and the health of the people in Bell County:

Prioritization of Identified Health Needs

The Pineville Community Health Center, Inc.'s, CHNA final steering committee meeting was held via Zoom, a virtual platform for meetings, April 7, 2021, to review findings from the community surveys, key informant interviews, focus groups and county specific secondary health data.

The process of priority selection followed the Association for Community Health Improvement (ACHI) recommendations to consider:

- The magnitude of the problem (i.e., the number of people or the percentage of a population impacted).
- The severity of the problem (i.e., the degree to which health status is worse than the national norm).
- A high need among vulnerable populations.
- The community's capacity/willingness to act on the issue.
- The ability to have a measurable impact on the issue.
- Community resources already focused on the issue.
- Whether the issue is a root cause of other problems.

CEDIK staff led a facilitated discussion with members of the steering committee after the data presentation and completed the process of prioritizing the identified health needs. The following represent the recommendations of the steering committee to Pineville Community Health Center, Inc. for addressing health needs in Pineville/Bell County and the hospital service area for the next three years.

Prioritized Needs

- 1. Substance Use Disorder
- 2. Hospital services
 - a. Increase specialty services
 - b. Market current/available health services and resources (both hospital and community)
- 3. Obesity and Diabetes
- 4. Cancer

Other health needs identified by steering committee but not selected as priority needs:

- Transportation
- Support grandparents raising grandchildren (result of substance use, loss of parent due to death or incarceration)
- Mental Health
- Unable to afford healthy foods

Implementation Strategy

Substance Use Disorder

- Increase awareness and knowledge about substance use including opioid epidemic, prescription drug abuse, and narcotic addictions.
- Educate the communities through the use of advertising, articles, and educational programs.

Community Partners: local physicians practices, Bell County Health Department, Bell County Sheriff Department, and Kentucky Agency for Substance Abuse Policy.

Hospital Services

- Inform the communities of the current health services and resources available at PCHC.
- Communicate plans for future health services through media advertising, attending local organizations' meetings, and conducting Town Hall Meetings.
- Continue contracting with specialists for regular clinics at PCHC in order to reduce patients need to travel long distances for their health needs.

Obesity and Diabetes

- Increase awareness and knowledge regarding the risks of obesity and diabetes
 by collaborating with partners to provide nutritional data, body fat and blood sugar
 analysis, and physical activity benefits to school, community and civic organizations,
 and employers groups.
- Host weight loss and diabetes support group meetings and educational classes at PCHC.

Community Partners: University of Kentucky Bell County Extension Office, Bell County Health Department, local restaurants, and school systems.

Cancer

- Provide education on prevention and screening programs including information on lung, prostrate, colon, and breast cancer.
- Contract with an Oncologist to conduct regular clinics at PCHC.
- Establish ongoing services such as mammograms, infusion clinics, annual wellness exams, and education on ways to prevent cancer and causes.

Community Partners: American Cancer Society, Kentucky Cancer Program, Bell County Health Department, Lincoln Memorial University, and Southeastern Kentucky Community Colleges.

Next Steps

This Implementation Strategy will be rolled out over the next three years, from Fiscal Year 2020 through the end of Fiscal Year 2022.

Pineville Community Health Center will kick off the implementation strategy by initiating collaborative efforts with community leaders to address each health priority identified through the assessment process.

Periodic evaluation of goals/objectives for each identified priority will be conducted to assure that we are on track to complete our plan as described.

At the end of Fiscal Year 2022, Pineville Community Health Center will review the implementation strategy and report on the success experienced through the collaborative efforts of improving the health of the community.
